Furthermore, our services reach out to supportive partners, families and friends who seek information or support around any issues relating to sexual violence. We are proactive in our activities in raising awareness and advancing education among professionals, the general public and young people. By focusing this on the causes, nature, prevalence and effects of abuse we seek to prevent sexual violence and challenge harmful societal attitudes that exist.

Across RASAC P&K Support Services, Youth Initiative, Training, Campaigning and Awareness Raising, our visions and values are strongly embedded throughout the work we do in striving towards freedom from rape and sexual abuse.

# **Yearly Overview**

# **Directors' Report—Alison Irvine**

It has been another successful and busy year for us at RASAC Perth. There has been a significant increase in the demand (79%) for Support Services. The reasons for this appear to be diverse but include the impact of our awareness raising work undertaken in schools which has encouraged young people who have experienced abuse, harassment and sexual assault to access support to address these issues. Additionally high profile media attention to the issues, and a continuing change in societal tolerance of sexual violence appear to have also encouraged survivors to come forward.

We continue to be funded by a wide range of much valued local and national funders who are essential to the continued delivery of the service. The Scottish Government VAW fund, Rape Crisis Specific Grant, Henry Smith, Forteviot Trust, Robertson Trust, Comic Relief, BIG Lottery, Perth and Kinross Council all fund particular aspects of the service allowing continued responsive developments to meet the changing needs of women. In addition Choose Life funding enables specific support to those affected by suicide and self harm.

RASAC Perth has also been successful in the last year in gaining new funding for specific projects. Firstly we secured an award for five years funding from the Big Lottery to develop a more holistic Children, Young People and Families project. It also provides continuing support for the crucial core infrastructure. Funding has also been made available by the Scottish Government specifically to develop Advocacy Services. Both of these new elements will contribute to RASAC Perth being able to provide a comprehensive service to those affected by Rape and sexual assault.

'Prevention', however, remains an important aspect of the service and a an amazing amount of work continues with young people in schools and community groups. A number of young people have been trained as Youth Ambassadors, to support the profile of the service with young people, and contribute to the development and delivery of services. We are proud and delighted to have them within RASAC.

Volunteers are of vital importance to the service. Their hard work and commitment is invaluable for those seeking support. All volunteers undergo training and 5 new volunteers have completed a comprehensive training programme this year.

The Board has continued its support to the service, now meeting more regularly on a monthly basis. In addition the Board members participated in a Development Day in August, identifying their priorities for the year. Inevitably a key priority is to support financial soundness in particular for the core service. Whilst the organisation manages its funding very effectively, we remain short in our target for Reserves, which are currently less than 3 months running costs for the service. A further priority for this year has been Pension Reform, ensuring that we are working to meet these requirements. Membership of the Board has seen change and further recruitment of new Trustees is a continued necessity.

Within this Annual Report you will read detailed information on the aspects of this essential service. It tells a story of hard work and achievement by dedicated staff and volunteers, but most importantly it tells of the improvement in the lives of those whom RASAC Perth seeks to support

# **DID YOU KNOW?**

At RASAC we believe that gender based violence and sexual violence are a direct result of living in a society which still has significant gender inequality. Society's expected gender roles assigned to men and women, boys and girls from birth, with the unrelenting portrayal of women as sexual objects in the media, defines and reinforces what is seen as appropriate gender behaviours, leading to inequalities in society.

Ultimately these inequalities manifest as a wide range of violence against women and children including, child sexual abuse, rape and sexual assault, sexual harassment, stalking, commercial sexual exploitation, domestic abuse, and harmful practices such as forced marriage, child marriage and female genital mutilation.

# **Strategic and Multi-Agency Work**

We are great believers in the power of working together to achieve common goals and this approach is crucial for our work toward eradicating sexual violence and gender based violence in Scotland.

# **A:** Awareness Raising

# Raising awareness of RASAC P&K Services, Gender Based Violence and Gender Inequality

Part of our role is to raise awareness of the support services available to survivors of sexual violence in Perth and Kinross, highlight the effects and damage gender based violence has on individuals and society and how ultimately gender inequality is the root cause of both gender based violence and sexual violence.

We do this in a number of ways; we actively engage in community events, setting up stalls, providing information and engaging with the public; we deliver our Prevention Programme in schools, youth settings and with carers (please see RASAC Youth Initiative page for more information); we develop tools and resources which can be shared with other organisations and groups looking to address sexual violence; we develop and host events highlighting and exploring issues; and we deliver a wide range of training to statutory and non-statutory organisation and community groups. In addition we have developed a quarterly publication, our RASAC Impact Newsletter, looking at the impact of sexual violence, the impact of our work and what is happening in Scotland in regards to policy development and national reports. The Impact Newsletter is available to all professionals and community workers in Perth and Kinross.

# **Events**

We have delivered:

- RASAC Volunteer Open Day open day at RASAC with staff and volunteers setting up the centre to welcome potential volunteer and anyone interested in finding out more about our services
- Consent Table Top Training as part of the 16 Days of Action in partnership with Perth and Kinross
  Violence Against women Partnership, we facilitated training looking at issues surrounding consent. The
  event focussed around the Channel 4 docu-drama 'Consent' enabling participants to see first-hand the
  impact of rape on survivors in terms of reporting and the court process. The event was attended by 40
  individuals from statutory and non-statutory agencies. 73% of participants told us their knowledge in the
  subject area of consent, reporting to police and/or the court process increased due to the training
- Support and Advocacy Service Launch highlighting RASAC new service providing practical and
  emotional support to women and young people who are engaging or considering engaging with the
  criminal justice system. The launch was followed by a talk and panel discussion with John Malpass from
  the Procurator Fiscals looking at the process of reporting and a wonderful and inspiring one woman
  performance by Naomi Breeze, 'One Lonely Word'. Over 30 people attended.

# **RASAC P&K Training**

Supporting others to better understand the Impact of sexual violence

Our training programme aims to support professional, carers and volunteers working with communities to better understand the impact of sexual violence and how to better support survivors in everyday services.

In the past year we have developed training and delivered training to a wide range of statutory and non-statutory organisations and professionals including; Police Scotland, prison staff, NHS, teaching staff, youth workers, family support organisations, social workers, parents and foster carers. Our training is tailored to each group according to identified training needs of the participants. In addition we have delivered 3 rounds of our robust 60 hour internal training programme to all our volunteers and staff.

Our training programme covers a wide range of subjects and issues including; Gender based violence, the impact of sexual violence, rape and childhood sexual abuse, self-harm and suicide, the effects of pornography on young people, commercial sexual exploitation, child sexual exploitation, organised and ritual abuse, consent, confidentiality and boundaries as well as honour based violence-forced marriage and female genital mutilation.

# 2015-2016 Developments

With the continued increasing demand for our support services, an increase of 79% in our referrals on the previous year, we have had an exceptionally busy year. With the increase in demand for support services there was a large increase in waiting times for support with some individuals waiting up to six months for a support worker.

This was clearly an issue we needed to address. In line with other services across Scotland RASAC-PK made the decision to move to a time limited service. In practice this means that our support service offers up to 21 sessions of support. We recognise that for some individuals that 21 sessions will not necessarily be enough and there is an option for survivors to re-refer into our support services.

We have sought to maximise and increase the amount of support available, our Support Services Team Leader came into post in August and we have an additional part-time support worker (currently funded until March 2017) on board. In September 2015 we also heard, form Rape Crisis Scotland, that all Centres would be receiving funding from the Scottish Government and Police Scotland to develop a Support and Advocacy project, with a Support and Advocacy Working coming into post in November 2015. This has enabled us to develop and improve our capacity to provide information to support survivors, whether the incident has been recent or historical.

Due to the increasing demand for our service from young survivors (40% of all referrals are for young people under the age of 24) we applied to the BIG lottery fund, we have been successful and the year ahead will see the ongoing development of this essential service that will develop support services for young survivors and their families.

We continue to ensure that our support workers continually develop new skills and this year we have seen workers training in the Comprehensive Resource Model, Emotional Freedom Technique, Eye Movement Desensitisation and Reprocessing therapy. In the coming year we hope to develop further these and other therapeutic interventions to benefit our service users.

This year also saw our Service User Forum established – we have had a number of meetings and it is a great way for those of you who use our service to have a say in how we develop, to find out more about what we are doing and have your voice heard.

With the increased demand for one to one services we have also reviewed the provision of our helpline service. Out of 20 hours a week of provision on average there was less than 2 hours per week being utilised. In consultation with survivors, staff, volunteers and funders we proposed and will implement in 2016-2017 a reduced helpline service of a minimum of 6 hours per week. This will also enable us to increase capacity to support survivors on a one to one basis.

At the end of March we were planning a consultation on the potential of developing drop in services. We are still waiting to hear about two sources of funding we have applied to in order to maintain our support services at the current level.

Over the coming year we will continue to monitor waiting times for support, review the feedback from the drop in consultation and develop new and existing services. It is an exciting and challenging time for us.

# DID YOU KNOW?

At RASAC we do not use the word 'victim' when referring to the women and young people we work with who have experienced sexual violence. The word 'victim' according to the Oxford Dictionary means; a person harmed, injured, or killed as a result of a crime, accident, or other event or action; a person who has come to feel helpless and passive in the face of misfortune or ill-treatment:'

We use the word 'Survivor' as according to the Oxford Dictionary, survivor means; 'a person who survives: especially a person remaining alive after an event; a person who copes well with difficulties in their life'.

The woman and young people we work with are inspirational and are the reason why our support team come in every day and deliver the services they do. Each one of them is a Survivor and although sexual violence can have devastating long term and short term effects and consequences, the women and young people we work with show us recovery is possible.

# **Improved Survivor Accessibility and Inclusion**

Part on improving our accessibility is to ensure that we improve our communication and consultations with survivors currently in RASAC support as well as survivors who do not wish or do not need to engage in support services. In addition we have also identified the need to ensure professionals working in Perth and Kinross know of our work and how to refer into our service.

- Service Users Forum facilitated 2 forums looking at subjects such as; Change of service, promoting groups, how to improve our services and our new befriending service
- Consultations facilitated /supported 3 consultations looking at accessibility of RASAC services and change in service, review of Helpline, and proposed drop in service
- Distributing information on RASAC Services in Perth and Kinross Annual Report, Quarterly Newsletters x 4, Impact Newsletter x 3, Facebook and social media interaction, Leaflets, Banner Pens, Wrist Bands, Postcards and Business Cards
- RASAC Multi Agency Visits In addition one of the key methods of ensuring survivors have access to support services is To ensure professionals and volunteers working in P&K know about our work, enabling them to refer survivors to our services. To improve the knowledge surrounding our services and to deal with the increasing demand in professionals wishing to come to RASAC for a visit, we have now developed a RASAC Multi Agency Visit Calendar which is widely advertised throughout Perth and Kinross. We have had 3 multi agency visits this year with medical practitioners, addiction counsellors, support staff from a wide range of organisation and university students attending and positively engaging.

# **Multi Agency Commercial Sexual Exploitation Group**

In ensuring that we have an inclusive support service we aim to continually identify and address the issues that women involved in commercial sexual exploitation have to experience on a daily basis. In last year's annual report we revealed our intention to bring together a range of relevant partner agencies to develop a Multi-Agency Commercial Sexual Exploitation (CSE) Group for Perth and Kinross. This was to create an opportunity for professionals to share their knowledge, skills and experience on the issue of CSE to try to establish an improved understanding of

the needs of those involved in CSE in Perth and Kinross as well as to engage in work to try to make the current situation of those involved safer and healthier, whether they are ready or able to leave CSE or not. Key services involved in the group include sexual health, adult protection, drug and alcohol, police, homeless services, and youth and support services, the group have also been fortunate enough to receive invaluable input from the Woman's Support Project and women previously involved in CSE. As a group we were also keen to look at the national picture and find out what was happening in regards to legislation and laws to protect the interests of those involved.

Information received from Police Scotland, our own statistics and the experiences of our colleagues in other organisations along with national and local media reports pointed us in the direction of initially focusing on off -street prostitution. With this in mind the group decided to develop a small discreet folding leaflet containing safety advice and information on local and national services, and now that they have been printed they will be distributed next year. The group have also explored the various routes for people being exploited through CSE to move to safe accommodation and identified gaps in service provision for those involved. Future aims of the group include the distribution of a questionnaire to other workers within the support and information services in Perth and Kinross to gauge their abilities and training needs regarding their level of confidence and skills at working with people involved in CSE. Following this it is our intention to design a postcard for workers with information to how to identify and positively respond to CSE.



In May 2015 following the group receiving local press coverage we were contacted by MSP Rhoda Grant who then come to visit RASAC P&K to hear about the work we were doing within the CSE group and also as an organisation to address the issue of CSE. Rhoda is also a firm advocate of introducing the Sex Buyer Law, this would see the buyers of sex being prosecuted and those involved in selling sex be decriminalised, RASAC P&K also strongly support this view. As an organisation opposed to any form of violence against women and girls, we support any changes in the law that would protect vulnerable people from commercial sexual exploitation. We believe in the majority of cases it is previous abuse, addiction, mental health issues or a real lack of realistic alternative choices that drive already vulnerable people into the hands of those who are looking to exploit them, and with this in mind it is the buyers of sex and pimps who have the choice and control in these situations.



# **Support and Advocacy Support Service**

The Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre, Perth & Kinross officially launched its Support & Advocacy Service in March 2016 at the AK Bell Library in Perth. The launch, which comprised of a presentation by the Centre's newly appointed Support & Advocacy Worker and welcomed guest speaker John Malpass (Procurator Fiscal Depute) and playwright, Naomi Breeze, ensured that a powerful and informative afternoon took place for attendees from a range of sectors.

Funded by the Scottish Government and in partnership with Rape Crisis Scotland, RASAC P&K's Support & Advocacy Service is delivered as part of a National Advocacy Project operating across Scotland's 14 Rape Crisis Centres. The overall aim of the project is to provide a consistent service which improves the support available to victims of rape and serious sexual crime as well as improving their experience of the criminal justice process.

While evidence from the Scottish Government's 2014/15 'Recorded Crime in Scotland Publication' indicates an increase in both the number of recorded sexual offences and convictions for sexual crimes, survivors are still significantly failing to get justice as rape/attempted rape and sexual assault are the two crime types receiving the highest 'not guilty' verdicts.




RASAC P&K have therefore welcomed the project and the Scottish Government's investment as the Support & Advocacy Service endeavours to meet survivor's needs while supporting them throughout the entire criminal justice process - from initial reporting to the police (if required), through to attendance at court, support while the verdict is given and beyond if necessary. A dedicated service, which will stand alongside a survivor from the initial report right the way through to court, will make a significant difference for those going through this process. The Support & Advocacy Service specialises in offering advocacy, information, emotional and practical support to women and young people aged 12 to 18 who have been affected by rape or sexual abuse. Survivors can make contact with the project at any time, irrespective of what stage they are at in the Justice Process.

The Support & Advocacy Worker, who has been in post since December 2015 is currently supporting survivors who are at various stages of the criminal justice process. Working alongside both statutory and third sector services, the service will enhance provision for survivors in Perth & Kinross, assisting and empowering them to become active participants in accessing their rights, to recover, seek justice and move forward from sexual violence. This is an exciting and welcome development in our service provision.


The collation of this information is also crucial for us in terms of being able to evidence to funders that the service does indeed make a difference.

This group aim to provide peer support to friends and family members of survivors enabling them to better speak and process their feelings about their loved ones experiences. Ultimately we hope this will lead to them being better able to support the survivor in in their lives as well as looking after their own wellbeing.

# **RASAC Youth Initiative (RYI)**

Prevention is a key part of our work at RASAC and the RASAC Youth Initiative works towards eradicating sexual violence through delivery of a wide range of workshops for young people within schools and community groups. All our



sessions are age appropriate and workshops delivered in schools compliment the Curriculum for Excellence.

The workshops we deliver aim to develop young people's understanding of the gendered nature of sexual violence and focus on aspects of society which we believe contribute to the prevalence of it. Issues explored range from gender stereotypes to sexualisation; from healthy relationships to sexual consent; from online safety to the influence of the media. A theme explored throughout the workshop programme is the negative gender stereotypes which permeate society and lead to inequality. Information on where young people can access support for themselves and their peers is always provided.

As a reflective organisation we continually review evaluations and feedback received from young people, teachers/youth workers, schools and community groups, to enhance our workshops and future delivery. We want to thank all the schools and community groups who have engaged with us and have provided us with valuable feedback enabling us to support and educate young people on issues related to sexual violence.

Our team are inspired by the young people we meet and their enthusiasm for learning, debating and questioning which is crucial if we want to ensure an equal and safe society. If we want to live in a world free from sexual violence it is imperative that as an organisation we not only support survivors but enable the future generation to be champions against sexual violence. With this aim in mind we also operate a Youth Ambassador programme. Read on to find out more.

# What young people tell us about TESSA...

(from evaluations at the end of a sessions)

Young people have expressed feeling more confident in recognising risk for themselves and their peers

Young people report being able to identify where they can access support such as RASAC. Police, Teachers and CEOP

Young people expressed an understanding in how everyday influences (media, music, advertising) can impact negatively on how they feel about themselves and their peers.

# **RYI Community Engagement**

Since August 2015, we have continued to develop work opportunities with young people in informal youth and community settings. We have worked with 72 young people in their local community groups. We have particularly attempted to target vulnerable and hard to reach young people.

We have built links with and engaged with young people at The Acoustic Café drop in based in Muirton, Logos Youth Centre in Crieff, a group from the organisation 'Who Cares' Scotland, the Salvation Army, PKAVS Young Carers ,Kinross Girls Group, and young parents from Gowans Family Centre.

The quality of the relationship RASAC staff have developed with the young people at Balnacraig is evident by us being a chosen charity to benefit from their "Twin Peaks" challenge.

Since Autumn 2015 we were involved in the development and production of a DVD promoting the work of RASAC P&K and in particular the Youth Initiative staff.

The development of the DVD explored issues of sexual violence and involved Ad Lib, a local youth theatre arts group based in Perth who scripted and performed drama scenes exploring issues relating to sexual violence, RASAC Youth Ambassadors and the Media students and Lecturers from Perth college who filmed and edited the DVD. A supporting educational resource for Teachers and Community group workers has been developed to accompany the DVD. A DVD launch event took place on 23 September 2015 and 41 representatives from other agencies attended the event. RASAC Youth Ambassadors delivered a presentation at the event about the work they undertake to increase awareness of the prevalence of sexual violence in their communities.

Positive feedback has been received from school and staff from other agencies about the benefit of the DVD to explain to work RASACC P&K and the extent of sexual violence in society.

We have further developed out Youth Ambassador programme, a peer mentoring and campaigning initiative for young people during the last year. The Youth Ambassadors successfully applied for 02 funding. Involvement with this funding body has provided the young people with the opportunity to access training in leadership and organisational skills.

The Youth Ambassadors have been actively involved in a number of projects throughout the year. Particular highlights have been participation in the 16 days of activism to end violence against women in November/December 2015 where they contributed articles to our website and Facebook pages, participated in Dundee's 'Reclaim the Night March' and attended a reception at the Scottish Parliament highlighting prevention work throughout Scotland. RASAC Youth Ambassadors also hosted a performance from Ben Atherton – Zeman, an American actor and campaigner against violence against women . In September 2016 our original group of Youth Ambassadors won a Perth and Kinross Council "Spirit of Youth" teen community award in recognition of their contribution in their communities. The young people have also obtained Saltire and Youth Achievement awards.

We believe that any woman regardless of skills, experience or qualifications can become an effective volunteer through training, induction, self reflection and finding the right volunteering role. All our volunteers at RASAC have to undergo a vigorous and thorough training and induction process before they even start to volunteer, which is the exact same process for our staff team as well










# Reported to the Police








# Reported to Police

There has been an increase in the amount of survivors who have reported to the police over the last 12 months. As can be seen from the chart presented above 49% of the survivor who assess our service reported to the police, while 47% did not. Of those who reported 39% reported at the time of the incident, while 23% reported within one year.
