Established in 2007, the Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre, Perth and Kinross (RASAC P&K) aims to relieve the distress of women and young people affected by rape, sexual abuse or exploitation through the provision of emotional and practical support, information, and advocacy. Furthermore, our services reach out to supportive partners, families, friends who seek information or support around any issues relating to sexual violence. We are proactive in our activities to raise awareness and advance education amongst professionals, the general public, and young people. By focusing on the causes, nature, prevalence, and effects of abuse we seek to prevent sexual violence and challenge harmful societal attitudes that exist.



DIRECTORS REPORT 2016-2017

Welcome to our 2016-17 Annual Report. It has been yet another busy year for RASAC P&K with increasing demand across all services as well as the development of our Young People and Families Service. With an overall increase of 15% in referrals to RASAC support services we have continued to deliver one to one, group and advocacy support consistently throughout the year.

The organisation continues a commitment to both Prevention and Support Services, ensuring that the voices and experiences of survivors are represented within our own service development as well as across various external forums shaping policy and service provision. This report illustrates a concise overview of our work across the year, highlighting how vital rape crisis service provision is for our local area.

Prevention has remained a core part of our service delivery and it has been a truly inspiring year in relation to the contribution that young people themselves have made. The time and effort that RASAC Youth Ambassadors have dedicated to raising awareness of equality issues and gender based violence, alongside the participation of young people in schools and community groups has been overwhelming. Ending sexual violence is our mission and the voices and experiences of young people living in Perth & Kinross are incredibly powerful in working towards this.

Our commitment to supporting improved responses to survivors has continued within our training and events. Participating in 9 community events, including the Tackling Childhood Neglect Conference and the Kinross Wellbeing and Health Fair, has allowed us to raise awareness about sexual violence and the range of RASAC P&K services available. We were thrilled to organise Perth's first Reclaim the Night in partnership with OWLS and the Violence Against Women Partnership. Seeing so many organisations, women, men and young people come together and convey the same message was extremely powerful.

Securing grant aid continues to be a priority for us as we strive to sustain services in what can be a challenging financial climate. It is with thanks to everyone who supports our work that we have been able to do so across the last 12 months. Scottish Government investment in supporting Scotland's Equally Safe's Strategy for preventing and eradicating violence against women and girls has enabled us to maintain a core number of support hours within the service. Commitment from others including The Robertson Trust, The Gannochy Trust, The Volant Charitable Trust, The Henry Smith Charity, Comic Relief, The Big Lottery and Perth & Kinross Council have given us the resources to deliver and enhance our services.

As we approach our 10th year we look forward to a year of celebration and reflection alongside the continuation and development of services responding to the needs of survivors and families living in Perth & Kinross.


RASAC SUPPORT SERVICES


This has been another busy and challenging year with continued and increasing demand for our services. We have seen the development of a new support service (Young People and Families Service) and significant increase in our Justice Advocacy Service, as well as our general Therapeutic Support.

As a reflective organisation we continually develop our services to reflect survivors needs and this year we have seen a weekly Drop-in Service open its doors for the first time from August 2016 as well as our new Befriending Service commencing in October 2016.

The impact of sexual violence cannot be underestimated. One of the biggest challenges that we have as an organisation, (which is all too often felt by survivors) is that many people minimise or simply do not realise how harmful and devastating the short and long-term consequences of sexual violence can be to individuals, families and society as a whole.

Every woman and young person we work with is an inspiration and each one evidences that control can be taken back and that survivors do reach their full potential and not only survive but thrive. It is an honour to walk along beside them through their healing journey.


REFERRALS TO RASAC SERVICES



We have seen a significant rise in the number of referrals from young people under the age of 25 in the last 3 years (226%).


We recognise this increase is partly due to the development and growth of our Prevention Workshops in schools by RASAC Youth Initiative.

Year on year we have increased the number of women and young people we have worked with due to the demand for our support services. However it is a challenge to keep up with the increasing demand with the limited resources we have in place.

RASAC SUPPORT SERVICES

In order to address the potential gaps in our Commercial Sexual Exploitation (CSE) P&K Working Group we have worked closely with The Encompass Network and the Women's Support Project, raising awareness of CSE locally.

One of the other points for consideration has been that we recognise that when we are talking about CSE, we are talking about complex needs. We have therefore looked at the work we are doing and over the next 12 months will be taking a more targeted approach to complex needs, ultimately being more proactive in addressing and supporting women involved in CSE in the ENCOMPASS long term.

OUR WORK WITH 'OWLS

Our engagement with OWLS (One-stop Women's Learning Service) has been extremely powerful and although establishing trust is something that has built up slowly across the last 2 years, the benefits of our partnership are clear. In the last 3 months of 2016 we received 6 referrals from OWLS. A big thanks you to OWLS for welcoming us into your

project and supporting us to build trusting relationships with the women you work with.

WORKING WITH SURVIVORS WHO ARE CONSIDERING REPORTING OR WHO ARE ALREADY ENGAGING WITH POLICE AND/OR THE JUSTICE PROCESS

Our **Justice Advocacy Service**(since Dec 2015) has seen a significant rise in the number of survivors accessing information and/or support about police reporting and the court process, enabling survivors to make informed choices as well as receive the support they need through part of or the entire justice process part of, or the entire justice process.

Through SARN a forensic medical examination may take place within 7 days. Any evidence gathered is stored and can be accessed at a future date if the survivor decides to make a report to the police

WORKING WITH YOUNG SURVIVORS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Our new Young People and Families **Service** has significantly increased the support we provided to young people and their families in the last 12 months. This service was born out of the large increase in referrals (226%) from under 24's since our Prevention Programme rollout in schools and community settings in 2012.




RASAC SUPPORT SERVICES THE DIFFERENCE SUPPORT CAN MA

The difference that support can make is evidenced in the graph to the right and the messages of hope we receive from the survivors using our services as seen below. We have met hundreds of survivors over the years and each of them inspire us with their determination to move through their trauma and pain. We use a number of tools to measure where survivors are in their healing journey which enables us to see how effective our services are as well as evaluating the techniques we use in our therapeutic support. As a reflective organisation we continually assess and develop our services according to needs identified within support.

Across this year we have identified the need to develop young people friendly outcome measuring tools, encapsulating their experiences and framing these within the wider GIRFEC wellbeing measures. In consultation with young people and experienced workers, we have created a new set of tools which we will trial in the coming year. We hope that this tool will enable us to measure the strengths that young people bring to support as well as the effects of sexual violence and their progress within support.

PREVENTION SERVICES RASAC YOUTH INITIATIVE

the community as well as our Youth Ambassador Team. One of the unexpected outcomes from this years work has been our work with students from Abertay University.

When Abertay University students first approached WRASAC Dundee for assistance to develop an online game looking at Consent, we were thrilled to work in partnership to support this exciting project. This involved initial training in Consent for all student designers and extensive consultation with young

people across Tayside.
The prototype was well received and went on to win the 'People's Choice' category at the

Games4Health competition.

This year we updated our prevention educational programme to incorporate the Rape Crisis Preventing Sexual Violence Resource Pack which was devised to support and develop the educational programmes delivered by Rape Crisis Centres in Scotland. This pack aims to increase young people's access to high quality sexual violence prevention education, promoting inclusion and recognising sexual orientation and issues relating to disability.

The workshops have been designed to complement the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence and can be incorporated within the PSE timetable. Additionally, the programme complements the Sexual Health and Relationships curriculum.

The **RASAC Youth Ambassadors** are a group of young people aged 14yrs to 18yrs who actively challenge gender inequality and gender expectations in society leading to the reduction and eradication of sexual violence. Through the RASAC Youth Initiative all the Youth Ambassador receive comprehensive training and support to understand sexual violence and delivering weekshops to other violence and the comprehensive training and support to understand. Our Youth and skills in delivering workshops to other young people. Our Youth Ambassadors use their volunteering hours with RASAC to support their Duke of Edinburgh, Saltire Awards and further education/employment applications.

STRATEGIC & MULTI—AGENCY WORK TOGETHER WE CAN BE THE CHANGE WE WANT TO SEE

It has been another productive year as we strengthen our community and strategic partnerships across Perth & Kinross. Working alongside so many dedicated others has supported the development of services for survivors and their families. Without this dedication, our ability to deliver such a range of responsive services would not be possible.

Our participation in the Perth & Kinross Child Sexual Exploitation Group and Stop to Listen Steering Group has enabled us to work closely alongside others in tackling sexual abuse and exploitation. Our continued participation in the Prevention and Recovery work streams has resulted in the planning for a Young People's CSE Advisory Group and the design of a CSE Directory for Agencies and Caregivers. We also remain involved it the delivery of the Child Sexual Exploiation training programme.

We supported the Choose Life Co-Ordinator in the faciliation of training designed to inform and skill up workers to implement a Choose Life / Suicide Prevention Policy within their own work settings. This was attended by staff within both the public and private sectors and received excellent feedback in terms of increased knowledge and confidence to take this forward.

We have continued administrative and organisational support to the Perth and Kinross Multi-Agency Prevention Network across the year. This group has been able to identify gaps in provision for young people, explore information about national and local developments affecting young people, share good practice and develop collaborative projects between the agencies. The running of multi-agency information stalls during Perth College's Fresher's week and 'Happy Healthy You' event are examples of the collaborative work the network has undertaken.




RASAC P&K STATISTICS



We thank all the survivors who share their information with us as we recognise that for many, this information is very personal and can be very difficult to talk about.






SURVIVORS AGE (WHEN IN SERVICE)

The statistics above shows that although society stereotypes sexual violence happening in dark alleys by strangers, the reality is that unfortunately a home, where one should be safe, is where someone is most likely to experience sexual violence. This is even more likely if you are under the age of 15.




77.5% of the survivors we worked with were under the age of 20 at the start of their abuse

In the last 24 months we have seen a **16%** increase in the number of survivors who were under the age of 20 when they were first abused.

GENDERED ANALYSIS OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE

The majority of victims and survivors of sexual violence in Scotland are women and children and the majority of their perpetrators are male. this is reflected in our statistic above. We describe this as gender based violence.

We believe that gender based violence is a direct result of gender inequality. The expected gender roles and behaviours assigned to men and women, boys and girls, are shaped and reinforced by society, defining appropriate behaviour for women and men often creating inequalities. These inequalities ultimately enable violence against women and children to manifest in society.

To combat gender based violence we must work towards changing societies attitudes towards gender for the benefit of men, women and children. This approach is known as a 'gendered analysis' and can be found at the core of all Rape Crisis centres in Scotland as well as the Scottish Governments Violence Against Women strategy 'Equally Safe'.

SEXUAL VIOLENCE MYTH... 'STRANGER DANGER'

The message that society tells us is 'stranger danger' and although we recognise that sexual violence can be perpetrated by strangers (6%) the statistics above clearly show that unfortunately you are most likely to experience sexual violence perpetrated by someone you know well (with parents, partners & ex partners accounting for 25%). Our largest category is 'Other Known Person' this includes, youth workers, sports coaches and peers/friends.
